SEEING YOUR LIFE THROUGH THE LENS OF THE GOSPEL Mt. 25:14-30

1. A gift given in love is given to be enjoyed, treasured and used. Through fear, one servant failed to recognise the loving trust being shown to him and buried the talent. When have you found that overcoming fear helped you to make the most of opportunities in life? 2. On the level of our own personal life, faith is not given to us to be locked away, but to be 'traded' with. We trade with it when we believe in its value, trust it, and use it, bringing it into the experiences we have in daily life. Can you recall times when relying on your faith has brought you rewards? 3. Likewise, with our own personal gifts and talents, we can fall into the trap of seeing these as our personal possessions so that we can do with them as we like, rather than share them as gifts so that they can be multiplied. What is your experience of hoarding or sharing your own gifts? When did you feel most alive? 4. Pope Francis, in his letter *The Joy of the Gospel* wrote, 'I invite everyone to be bold and creative in this task of rethinking the goals, structures, style and methods of evangelization in their respective communities...The important thing is not to walk alone, but to rely on each other as brothers and sisters.' (EG 33) How is your parish responding to this call? (Intercom)

FAMILY PRAYER TIME (Loyola Press)

In today's Gospel, Jesus talks about the correlation between faithfulness and responsibilities. Family life provides many opportunities to illustrate this connection for children. As children prove themselves trustworthy, they can be trusted to take on greater responsibilities. Jesus teaches us in this parable that when we show ourselves to be trustworthy in small matters, we can be trusted to participate in greater matters of responsibility. As you gather as a family, take some time to recall how each child in the family has matured and can now be trusted with greater responsibilities.. Say: In today's Gospel, Jesus talked about how our trustworthiness in small matters shows that we can also be trusted to share in the work of serving the Kingdom of Heaven. Read Matthew 15:14-30 and say, 'We share in the work of serving the Kingdom of Heaven and serve others'. As a family, choose one thing to do this week to serve others. Conclude in prayer together, asking God's help so that your family may serve others more faithfully.

CHILDRENS' CORNER (Loyola Press)

God created us and gave us different talents, or things we are good at. Things like playing music, reading, playing a sport, doing maths, playing chess, digging in the garden, comforting a friend. God wants us to use the gifts he has given us to help others.



In today's Gospel, Jesus tells a parable, or story. In the parable he mentions a different type of talent, a type of coin. Listen to what each of the three servants does with his talents. The first two servants used their talents. Their master rewarded them, but he punished the third servant. Why was the third servant punished? He buried his talents. What would happen if we had talents that we 'buried' or did not use? We couldn't help people. We wouldn't let them enjoy them. Let's not bury our talents! Make a plan to use one of your talents this week to help someone. Thank you, God, for the talents you have given us. We will use them to help others.
