MISSION SUNDAY - SUNDAY 18TH OCTOBER

This weekend parishes in over 120 countries will celebrate World Mission Sunday. World Mission Sunday is a direct appeal from Pope Francis. He is asking all of us to give what we can so that overseas missionaries can reach and care for suffering men, women and children. On World Mission Sunday, all Mass collections, including those from the most impoverished churches in the developing world, will be offered to help further the reach of missionaries and mission. The collection is a lifeline, not only to missionaries, but also the future of the Church. However, it is in jeopardy. The worldwide pandemic means that less of us can physically attend Mass, resulting in less offerings in the basket. Its implications for suffering overseas communities in the months ahead will be devastating. COVID-19 brings fear, but it also shows us that selfless and courageous actions are not reserved solely for saints. In fact, they can be found in every one of us, and that by standing in solidarity together we can do more. Please, if you can, be extra generous this weekend. Your kindness will be used in the coming months to support overseas missionaries who dedicate their lives to some of the most impoverished and overcrowded communities in the world. This year's theme '*Together we can do more - Blessed are the Peacemakers*' is highlighting that our Church is a global community that must stand together if it is to do more. Their theme also recognises our missionaries as peacemakers. In many of our poorer parishes in Africa, Asia and Latin America, it is missionaries who are on the front line. We already owe these women and men so much, as they walk hand-in-hand with marginalised communities, long before and after any emergency. Just like Jesus, the Prince of Peace, missionaries emulate love and harmony as they reconcile fragile people from fractured communities, with God and with each other.

CHURCH CLEANING

The church interior, all its contents, the toilets and the Parish Centre are now being sprayed with Zoon-71 which gives 30 days protection against Covid-19. It leaves a coating which is active against the virus for at least one month. Please continue to observe all the personal hygiene requirements to help combat the spread of this disease.

WHAT DOES WORLD MISSION SUNDAY ACTUALLY SUPPORT?

The needs of mission dioceses vary greatly, anything from a motorbike so a priest can celebrate Mass in a remote village, to a community hall that will allow people to gather in safety, or more urgently, providing vaccinations and medicines to protect vulnerable children in parish dispensaries.

In essence World Mission Sunday (a) provides basic infrastructure by helping communities build schools, clinics, parish halls and churches (b) prepares the future leaders and carers of the Church by supporting the training of sisters, priests, religious brothers and catechists (c) supports missionary programmes that protect and care for children's spiritual and physical well-being by offering safe shelter, healthcare, education, and hope for the future.

OCTOBER - Month of the Rosary:

The Rosary developed a parallel with the Monastic Office with the 150 psalms mirroring the 150 Hail Marys of the Rosary cycle. The cycle outlines the history of salvation from the announcement of Christ's birth to Mary's coronation in heaven. Many religions use beads to quiet the mind. The repetition of prayers and the handling of the beads create a space to allow the Spirit whisper to our hearts the wonder and mystery of God's love for us. October invites us to recover a renewed appreciation of the rosary as a contemplative and Christ-centred prayer. In this Mission Month we pray especially for all missionaries, peace keeping soldiers, development workers and NGOs who are serving others.

Caryll Houselander (1901-1954) wrote some beautiful prayers on the rosary while she was lying flat on her back as London was being bombed in World War II. Here is an excerpt of her prayers:

The Finding in the Temple through Mary seeking her lost Son,
may we be given peace, always to seek for the Christ-child
and always to find him.

Let us find him in all children, and in all who have a child's needs,
the helpless, the sick, the simple, the aged;
in all who serve and are trusting and poor;
in all who are lonely and homeless.
Let us, too, become as little children,
to find the Divine Child in our own hearts.
