MASSES

Church spaces will be allocated on a first come basis. It is highly recommended that in all indoor settings a face mask is worn.

- (1) In accordance with Government guidelines numbers continue to be 50 attending Mass
- (2) Because of the limitation of numbers, it may be only family members that can be present at some Masses for first anniversaries or Month's Mind mass. (This will be subject to change in line with guidelines)
- (3) Everyone is asked to please maintain the 2 meter distance as marked on the tarmacadam once you enter the church grounds, and to follow the directions of stewards.
- (4) You are asked to remain in your seat as Holy Communion will be distributed to you there.
- (5) Please leave your seat row by row, at the end of Mass.

Anyone remaining at home for the time being who wish to receive Holy Communion at the weekend, please contact the Parochial House to arrange for a Minister of the Eucharist to do so.

From this weekend Oct 3rd/4th, Saturday evening Mass and the two Sunday Masses are open to the whole parish and not just to particular areas as has been the case. It would be good to see families coming to Mass together. Hopefully the extra Mass will encourage that to happen.

SEEING YOUR LIFE THROUGH THE LENS OF THE GOSPEL: Matthew 21:33-43 (intercom)

1. The target audience of this allegorical parable are the Jewish chief priests and elders portrayed here as rejecting Jesus and his teaching and, as a consequence, losing out on what God was offering them. It is a story of opportunity for life presented and rejected, and they lose out in the process. How important have you found it to recognise and accept opportunities for growth, development and new life when these were presented to you? 2. The parable is also a cautionary tale about the destructive effects of greed - doing violence to the rights of others and eventually destroying the greedy themselves. What attitude towards possessions has helped you to be at peace in yourself and at peace with others? 3. The vineyard of the Lord is an image of God's people. As we look at the vineyard we have been given, we can ask ourselves 'are we good tenants?' Recall times when you have been a good tenant, and reached out caringly for those around you.

FAMILY PRAYER TIME

In an ideal household, family members know the rules and follow them consistently. Even the most conscientious among us, however, sometimes need to be reminded of the rules and their importance. How we respond to such correction reveals our true character. In today's gospel, Jesus exposes the religious leaders for their failure to heed God's messengers. It is an opportunity for us to consider how we respond to those who are God's messengers today, calling us to correct our ways and return to the way of the Lord. As you gather as a family, talk about some of the most important rules of your household. Consider how consistently family members follow these rules. How are family members reminded when rules are not being followed? How do they respond? In today's gospel Jesus corrects the religious leaders through a parable telling them that they have not heeded God's messengers. Read Matthew 21:33-43. What are some of God's rules that we must follow? How do we respond to God's messengers today? Pray together the Act of Contrition for times when your family
