PUBLIC CELEBRATION OF THE EUCHARIST UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

Under the present public health guidelines we are able to have two sections of 50 persons each in our church. Section A entrance/exit is the side door facing the Parochial House and Section B entrance/exit is the church's Main Door. There can be no intermingling of the two sections. Social distancing of 2 meters within sections, wearing face masks if at all possible, and hand sanitizing are to be observed. Members of the same household can be together in seat but different households need to be 2 meters apart if in same seat. Holy Communion will continue to be distributed in the seats and on the hand. Choir is not permitted at this time. Thank you to stewards for their great assistance and to our sacristan, James, for keeping the interior of the church and all its contents thoroughly sanitized and as well as keeping necessary supplies up to date.

POPE'S INTENTIONS FOR JULY: Social Friendship. We pray that, in social, economic and political situations of conflict, we may be courageous and passionate architects of dialogue and friendship.

SEEING YOUR LIFE THROUGH THE LENS OF THE GOSPEL - Mark 6:1-6 (Intercom)

1. Personal prejudices and agendas can block us from listening to what another person has to say. Who do you think they are? Perhaps you have experienced this. What difference has it made to you when you were able to focus on the content of what was being said and leave to one side your own prejudice about the speaker?
2. It has been said that there is nothing as useless as the right advice at the wrong time. We may want to reach out to another but may be unable to because at that moment the other person is not ready to be helped. Like Jesus we can 'do no deed of power'. As Jesus had to be patient and wait for another opportunity, so do we. What have you learned about the importance of patience in working with others?

3. Religion easily brings up prejudices. Some dismiss religion as superstition, old hat, or based on an outdated world view. Even among believers, prejudice can make it hard for individuals to listen to an alternative way of looking at things, to consider a different way of celebrating liturgy, or to live at peace with difference. Yet a closed mind can lead to a stagnant faith. When have you found that a willingness to consider a different perspective led to a deepening and strengthening of your faith?

FAMILY PRAYER TIME (Loyola Press)

Our family plays an important role in shaping us and forming our self-dignity. In family life, we find a safe place to discover who we are and who God calls us to be. But sometimes the influences from outside our family can make us unrecognisable to those who know us best. These outside influences can lead us away from God, or they can lead us towards a deeper relationship with God. In today's Gospel, we see that the people of Nazareth could not recognise Jesus as the Son of God. They could know him only as the son of Mary. We hope that through our family life we will be encouraged to filter the many influences on our lives through the lens of faith so that we will become the person that God calls us to be.

As you gather as a family, talk about the people and events that are influencing members of your family. Acknowledge that many of these people and events are positive influences, helping us be better people and leading us to a deeper relationship with God. Also acknowledge, however, that there are negative influences in our lives that risk pulling us away from God. Observe that Jesus was a person who allowed his relationship with God to be the most important thing in his life. This led many people to have faith in him as the Son of God. However, not everyone could recognise this about Jesus.

Read today's Gospel, Mark 6:1-6. Ask: Who does not recognise Jesus as God's Son in this Gospel? (some of his kinfolk in Nazareth.) Observe that because of the people's lack of faith, Jesus could not perform many miracles in Nazareth. Conclude by praying together that our families will continue to help us follow God in our lives. Pray together the Prayer for Vocations. *God, in Baptism you called me by name and made me a member of your people, the Church. Help all your people to know their vocation in life, and to respond by living a life of holiness. For your greater glory and for the service of your people, raise up dedicated and generous leaders who will serve as sisters, priests, brothers, deacons and lay ministers. Send your Spirit to guide and strengthen me that I may serve your people following the example of your Son, Jesus Christ, in whose name I offer this prayer. Amen.*

CHILDRENS CORNER (LOYOLA PRESS)

In today's Gospel we learn some interesting information about Jesus' early life. What are some things we learn about Jesus? (He is a carpenter; he is Mary's son; he has other relatives) When this Gospel was written the words *brother* and *sister* would be used to describe cousins and other relatives.



What are some unique things that the people of Nazareth notice about Jesus? (They noticed that he had great wisdom and was able to do mighty deeds) This Gospel tells us that the people in Jesus' home town, Nazareth, were amazed by the things that Jesus taught and the things he did, but they did not have faith that Jesus was God's Son, and so, Jesus did not perform many miracles there. We believe that Jesus is the Son of God, and so Jesus can do great things in our lives. Conclude in prayer, thanking God for sending us his Son, Jesus. *Father in heaven, you love me, you are with me night and day. I want to love you always, in all I do and say. I'll try to please you, Father, bless me through the day. Amen.*
