PUBLIC CELEBRATION OF THE EUCHARIST UNTIL FURTHER NOTICE

Under the present public health guidelines we are able to have two sections of 50 persons each in our church. Section A entrance/exit is the side door facing the Parochial House and Section B entrance/exit is the church's Main Door. There can be no intermingling of the two sections. Social distancing of 2 meters within sections, wearing face masks if at all possible, and hand sanitizing are to be observed. Members of the same household can be together in seat but different households need to be 2 meters apart if in same seat. Holy Communion will continue to be distributed in the seats and on the hand. Choir is not permitted at this time. Thank you to stewards for their great assistance and to our sacristan, James, for keeping the interior of the church and all its contents thoroughly sanitized and as well as keeping necessary supplies up to date.

FIRST FRIDAY VISITS for the month of July will take place this week. Please contact one of the priests if your name is not on their list and you would like to receive a visit.

POPE'S INTENTION FOR JULY: Social Friendship. We pray that, in social, economic and political situations of conflict, we may be courageous and passionate architects of dialogue and friendship.

SAINTS PETER and PAUL - 29th June: We can learn from Peter and Paul's life. Paul converted from being a brutal persecutor to a fearless preacher through the grace of Christ. Peter learned that his denials are restored by love. Both men show us by their lives that recovery from their mistakes and openness to God's love gave them courage to witness to the faith. We all have shaky egos that are vulnerable to shame. But each of us, like Peter and Paul, are also called by name for God's kind purpose and plan.

SAINT OLIVER PLUNKETT (1 Nov 1625-1st July 1681) was the Roman Catholic Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland. He maintained his duties in Ireland in the face of English persecution and was eventually arrested and tried for treason in London. He was hanged, drawn and quartered at Tyburn on July 1, 1681, and became the last Roman Catholic martyr to die in England. Oliver Plunkett was beatified in 1920 and canonised in 1975, the first new Irish saint for almost seven hundred years.

FAMILY PRAYER TIME (Loyola Press)

There are many ways in which we can compare the request for healing made by Jairus and the request of the woman with the hemorrhage. One comparison helps us think about prayer. Jairus asked Jesus for healing on his daughter's behalf; the woman with the hemorrhage had no one to speak for her and bravely approached Jesus on her own initiative. In our prayers, we do both. We intercede for others' needs, and we also courageously express our own needs to God. We find hope in Jesus' response to both of these people who sought him out in their hour of need. As you gather as a family, talk about some of the things you have prayed for this week. Notice that some of the prayers may have been for other people, and some of your prayers may have been for your own needs. In today's Gospel we find encouragement for both kinds of prayer. Read together today's Gospel, Mark 5:21-43. Talk about the similarities and differences between the two people who presented their needs to Jesus in this Gospel. Notice that both people received the healing they sought from Jesus. We want to pray for the needs of others and for our own needs with as much faith and hope as Jairus and the woman with the hemorrhage did. Pray together in thanks and praise to God, who hears our needs and answers them, by praying today's psalm, Psalm 30.

13th Sunday in Ordinary time - SEEING YOUR LIFE THROUGH THE LENS OF THE GOSPEL (Intercom)

1. Like this woman, have you had the experience of a cure, an improvement, a success, after a long period of nothing happening? What was this like for you? What made the difference? On that occasion was there anything different in you, in others, in the circumstances - something that paved the way for the change or improvement? 2. 'Who touched me?', Jesus asked. It seems a strange request with crowds milling around. Many people brushed against him, but the woman made contact in a different way. The same can happen in our relationships. We brush against many people but make real contact only with a few. Who are the people you have touched, and who has touched you? What difference has this made to you and to them? 3. Jesus said to the woman, 'Your faith has made you well'. What difference does it make to you that you have faith? In what way does your faith make you well? 4. When Jairus asked Jesus to come and cure his daughter, some thought there was no point. Sometimes a situation can look like a lost cause. Has it ever happened to you that subsequent events showed there was hope where you thought there was none?

CHILDRENS CORNER (LOYOLA PRESS)

Who takes care of you when you are sick? Has the person who cares for you ever had to get help for you when you were sick, for example, by taking you to the doctor or by going to the pharmacy to get medicine? It's good that we have people who take care of us when we are sick. Have you ever helped care for someone who was sick? What does it feel like to be with someone who is sick? In today's Gospel, we hear about a man named Jairus, who had a daughter who was sick. Jairus came to Jesus to ask for his help because he believed that Jesus could make his daughter well again. What does Jairus ask Jesus to do to make his daughter well? (to lay his hands on her) What happens while Jesus is walking to Jairus' house? (Messengers report that Jairus' daughter has died) What does Jesus do? (He tells Jairus not to be afraid; he continues to Jairus' house, he says that the girl is only sleeping and he raises her and makes her well) Jesus cares for people who are sick and wants them to be well again. He also teaches us to care for those who are sick. Jesus gave us a sacrament that brings healing and forgiveness to people who are sick. It is called the Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. One of the ways in which we care for those who are sick is by praying for them, asking Jesus to heal them, just as Jairus asked Jesus to heal his daughter. Name other people you know who are sick. Pray prayers of petition, asking Jesus to heal each person named by praying, 'Jesus, heal us'. Conclude your prayer time by praying together the Glory Be To The Father.
