21 NOV. - PRESENTATION OF MARY. This memorial originally marked the dedication of a sixth century church of the Virgin Mary near the Temple of Jerusalem. The feast is best linked with the other feasts of the birth of Mary (8th Sept) and of the Immaculate Conception (8th Dec). It highlights the holiness of Mary from the beginning of her life on earth that continued through her early childhood and beyond.

22 NOV. ST CECILIA VIRGIN, MARTYR. Though a late fourth century church in Rome was named after her, nothing is known of her life or death. Popular legends were written about her in the late 5th century, and in the 16th century she was named the patron of music. Honoured by the Church as a virgin, martyred for the faith, her name is included in Eucharistic Prayer I (The Roman Canon).

23 NOV: PRAYER TO ST COLUMBAN - Born in Leinster about 543; died on this day in 615 at Bobbio (Italy). A monk and teacher at Bangor until middle aged who left with twelve companions as "exiles for Christ" to found monasteries in Burgundy (France). He went on to extend the Irish mission through the Alps and into Italy. Author of a monastic rule and a penitential. Noted for his austerity of life, his missionary energy, and his role in the development of individual reconciliation.

CHILDREN'S CORNER (Loyola Press)

God created us and gave us different talents, or things we are good at. God wants us to use the gifts he has given us to help others. In today's Gospel, Jesus tells a parable, or story. In the parable, he mentions a different type of talent, a type of coin. We hear what each of the three servants does with his talents. The first two servants used their talents. Their master rewarded them, but he punished the third servant. Why was the third servant punished? (He buried his talents.) What would happen if we had talents that we "buried" or didn't use? (We couldn't help people. We wouldn't get to enjoy them.) Let's not bury our talents! Make a plan to use one of your talents, something you are good at or that you like to help someone this week. Pray: Thank you, God, for the talents you have given us. We will use them to help others. Our Father...

FAMILY PRAYER TIME (Loyola Press)

In today's Gospel, Jesus talks about the correlation between faithfulness and responsibilities. Family life provides many opportunities to illustrate this connection for children. As children prove themselves trustworthy, they can be trusted to take on greater responsibilities. Jesus teaches us in this parable that when we show ourselves to be trustworthy in small matters, we can be trusted to participate in greater matters of responsibility. As you gather as a family, take some time to recall how each child in the family has matured and can now be trusted with greater responsibilities. In today's Gospel, Jesus talked about how our trustworthiness in small matters shows that we can also be trusted to share in the work of serving the Kingdom of Heaven. Read Matthew 15:14-30. We share in the work of serving the Kingdom of Heaven when we use our talents to help and serve others. As a family, choose one thing to do this week to serve others. Conclude in prayer together, asking God's help so that your family may serve others more faithfully.

SEEING YOUR LIFE THROUGH LENS OF THE GOSPEL - Thirty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (Intercom)

A gift given in love, is given to be enjoyed, treasured, and used. Through fear, one servant failed to recognise the loving trust being shown to him and buried the talent. When have you found that overcoming fear helped you to make the most of opportunities in life? On the level of our own personal life, faith is not given to us to be locked away, but to be 'traded' with. We trade with it when we believe in its value, trust it, and use it, bringing it into the experiences we have in daily life. Can you recall times when relying on your faith has brought you rewards? Likewise with our own personal gifts and talents. We can fall into the trap of seeing these as our personal possession so that we can do with them as we like, rather than share them as gifts so that they can be multiplied. What is your experience of hoarding or sharing your own gifts? When did you feel most alive? Pope Francis in his letter The Joy of the Gospel wrote, 'I invite everyone to be bold and creative in this task of rethinking the goals, structures, style and methods of evangelisation in their respective communities. The important thing is to not walk alone, but to rely on each other as brothers and sisters.
